

SAMPLE COURSE OFFERING FOR MONLUX

MODERNIZING AMERICA’S HIGH SCHOOLS PLAN

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ACCOUNTING: Accounting I: This class will teach students the beginning, intermediate, upper level and advanced theories of Accounting.

Accounting II: This class is a continuation of Accounting.

Accounting III: This class will teach advanced accounting techniques.

Accounting IV: This class will continue and expand on the advanced accounting techniques in

5: Federal & State Income Tax: This class will teach students how to file state and federal income taxes.

6: Professional Book Keeping: This class will teach students how businesses organize their books, count stock and inventory, count losses and profits.

AGRICULTURE: Agriculture Law: This class will teach students about the laws regulating agriculture from subsidies to grants and growing seasons in addition to irrigation regulations.

Farm Help: This is a class granting credit to students who need to be on the family farm/ranch for an additional hour each day or those working for a farm or ranch.

Fishing/Hunting Laws: This class will teach students about the hunting laws and license regulations in both their state and the surrounding states.

History of Agriculture: This class will teach students about the history of agriculture around the world overtime.

Illegal Agriculture Substances: This class will teach the federal classification system and explain why certain crops are considered illegal under Federal law despite being grown.

Intro to Agriculture Science: This class will teach students about the Agriculture industry and the technical terms.

Intro to Agriculture Technology: This will teach students about the current technologies and tools used in all aspects of agriculture.

Live Stock Competition Showing: For students participating in livestock competition they shall receive 0.5 credits per semester including the summer term toward agriculture credit.

Planting Techniques/Times: This class will teach students the proper time and conditions to plant crops for the purpose of food growing.

Rodeo Competition: For students participating in a rodeo completion they shall be granted 0.5 credits per semester including the Summer term.

Apprenticeships: Students who have a chance to lead or participate in an incredible outside of school opportunity that the school is not able to offer, or receive direct training from a mentor in the field may petition their schools administration and have it apply as Elective Credit. In order for this to occur the student must be at least 15 years of age, say an oath and sign a form that it is done by their own free will, it requires approval of the person they will be learning from/working for, approval of the school administration, the office of the District Superintendent of the school district of the student and the approval of the parent(s)/legal guardian(s) (unless the student is 18+) of the student.

ART: Art Museum Internship/Job: For a student holding a job or internship with 10+ hours a week for 12 weeks or more for each Fall/Spring Semester and 6 weeks per Summer they shall be awarded 0.5 credits.

Beginning Art in History: This class will be a basic introduction to Art throughout various Historical time periods.

Contemporary Art History: This class is a basic introductory course to the different styles of Art.

Modern Art: This class will study the modern art movements.

Black & White Drawings/Paintings: This class will cover and teach how to add detail into Black and White.

Decoration and Design I & II: These Classes will teach students how to decorate and design rooms.

Drawing I, II, III & IV: These classes will cover and teach the various areas of Drawing.

Finger Painting I, II, III & IV: These classes will teach the various forms and types of finger painting.

Museum Art Collections around the World: This class will teach students the importance of museums, examine famous collections of museums around the World and take a field trip to all Oklahoma Art Museums to view their collections.

Photography I, II, III & IV: These classes will teach the importance of photos in life, the advantages and disadvantages of different angles and lenses and touch up in addition to traditional film development.

Religious Art: This class will explore and teach the use of Art in Religion throughout History. In addition it will explore the architecture and painting of major World Religions Headquarter Buildings/Holy Sites.

Water Color I, II, III & IV: These classes will teach students how to paint with Water Colors.

BUSINESS: Business Ethics: This class will teach students about the ethical and moral implications and dilemmas faced in today's modern Business World.

Business Internship/Job: For any student holding a job or internship with a company during the semester they shall receive credit.

Business Investments: This class will teach about business investment opportunities in the business world.

Business Law: This class will teach students about Federal, International and State Laws and Regulations on Businesses today.

Entrepreneurship: This class will teach students what it takes to start various types of businesses.

Intro to Business: This class will teach students about the basic concepts and principles of businesses.

Global Business Education: This class will teach students about the benefits and challenges of doing business abroad.

Professional Basics: This class will introduce students to business professionalism and meeting protocols.

Resume & Interview Prep: This class will teach students how to make a cover letter, put together a resume and teach students how to interview for jobs.

CAREER/COLLEGE PREP: Career Prep: For students wanting to go to VO Tech and or straight into the Work Force this class will help them prepare for and make that transition.

College Entrance Exams Prep: This class will help students prepare and study for the specific requirements of the College that they are interested in. This class can only be taken between the last semester of Sophomore Year and the first semester of Senior year. In addition it will also offer ACT & SAT Prep.

College Field Trips: This class will take students on a tour of the all in state universities and colleges.

College Interview Prep: This class will help students get and prepare for Interviews with various colleges that require interviews in their application process.

College Prep: This class will be a general combination introduction to the college process in general and be required to take and complete before a student can enroll in any other College Prep Courses in this section.

Concurrent Enrollment: For students taking classes at a community college, vo tech or university they are eligible to earn concurrent enrollment credit.

Designing a Dorm Room on a Budget: This class will teach students how to have the coolest looking dorm room without spending very much money.

Goal Setting and Planning for College: This class will teach students how to set and achieve goals in colleges while being able to seek out the opportunities that the student wants in her/his life.

International Colleges: This class will be for students who are interested in Studying Abroad at any College outside of the US. It will help them understand Foreign Application Process and Admission Requirements and Student Visa Applications, Processes & Procedures.

COMMUNITY SERVICE: Each High School shall set up its own Community Service Policy in regards what counts for credits toward the hour policy in addition to exemptions and exceptions.

CULINARY ARTS: Appetizers: This class will teach students how to make various types of Appetizers.

Asian Cuisine: This course would teach students about the cuisines and dishes in Asia.

Cuban Cuisine: This class will teach students about the foods and dishes of Cuba.

Deserts: This class will teach students how to make deserts.

European Cooking: This class will introduce students to the various types of food in many different European Cultures and Countries. In addition it will teach students how to make big main signature dishes from each country.

French Cooking: This class will introduce students to the types of foods in France and teach students how to cook French dishes.

International Cuisine: This class will introduce students to the various types of food from all around the World.

Italian Cuisine: This class will introduce students to the different regions and types of cooking in Italy. In addition it will teach students how to bake traditional and famous Italian dishes.

Latin American Cuisine: This class will teach students the traditions and history of Latin American Food in addition to teaching students how to cook both famous and traditional Latin American dishes while comparing and contrasting the styles of cooking throughout Central and South America.

Meat Management: This class will teach students about the various types of meats and how to prepare them.

Mediterranean Cuisine: This class will teach students about the Mediterranean diet and lifestyle.

Menu Planning: This class will teach students how to plan a menu for events, parties and social get together applications.

Restaurant Internship/Job: For a student working 2+ nights a week OR working weekends in a restaurant regardless of host, server, cook or anything else they shall receive 0.5 credits per term.

Russian Cooking: This class will teach students about the various types of Russian Cuisine. In addition it will teach students how to bake traditional and famous Russian dishes.

Spanish Cooking: This class will teach students the cultural cuisine and dishes of Spain.

Vegetarian Lifestyle and Cuisine: This class will teach students what Vegetarians are, their life style choices and diet, in addition to teaching students how to prepare Vegetarian Dishes.

CULTURE: Comparative Cultures I: This class will compare and contrast the sub cultures of America.

Comparative Cultures II: This class will compare and contracts the cultures of Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, North America & South America.

Comparative Societal Romance Rules: This class will examine and explore the love, sexual, marriage and dating rules/customs of various countries/regions of the World.

Cultural Immersion Abroad: For each Semester/Summer abroad the student shall receive 0.5 credits.

Fashion Trends: This course will examine how fashion trends form, are recycled, look at the history of clothes and articulate the difference between a Kilt and a Skirt along with flats, platform shoes and heels.

Intro to Cinema Studies: This course will introduce students to classic movies and learn to look for underlying themes and recycled plots of history in various movies.

Intro to Cultural Studies: This class will examine the base elements in the cultural circle and cultural elemental table.

Gender Roles of Cultures: This will examine, compare and contrast both traditioanl and modern gender roles. It will also look at Mosuo Women domination in China and other aspects of gender in society.

Musical Influence on Culture: This song will examine popular lyrics of past and present and then based off popular phrases see how it is acted out in in society overtime.

Religious Influence on Culture: This will examine and explore how religion has incluned cultures and how the culture at the time of formation influenced religion.

DANCE: Ballroom Dancing: This course shall teach the basics of ballroom dancing.

Cha-Cha Slide: This course shall teach students to become Masters at doing the Cha-Cha Slide.

Dance: This class shall teach various styles and forms of dancing throughout History.

Dance History: This class will teach the name of each type of dance, the music that accompanies it and how it came about in addition to how it is practiced around the world today.

Dance Studio Internship/Job: For those working/interning at a dance studio, they shall receive 0.5 credits per semester/summer.

Salsa: This class shall teach students how to do the Salsa.

School Dance Planning/Host: For students that help organize and set up the school dances for a Semester/Summer they shall receive 0.5 credits.

Tango: This class shall teach students how to do the Tango.

ECONOMICS: Applied Economics: This class will teach students about practical everyday home economics.

African Markets: This class will teach students about both the economies of Africa and investment opportunities in African Stock Markets.

Asian Markets: This class will teach students about both the economy structures of Asia and investment opportunities in Asian Markets.

Beginning Macroeconomics: This class will teach students about Macroeconomics.

Beginning Microeconomics: This class will teach students about Microeconomics.

Comparing & Contrasting Economic Systems: This class will have students compare and contrast the various types of Economic Systems around the World.

European Markets: This class will teach students about both the economic structures of Europe and investment opportunities in Europe.

Internet Commerce: This class will teach students about doing business online.

Latin American Markets: This class will teach students about investment opportunities and stock markets in Latin America.

Middle Eastern Economies: This class will teach the economic history, the political history and the modern day economic structure in Middle Eastern Countries.

ELECTIVES: Each School shall 100% total control and freedom over any and all of its Elective Course Offerings.

ENGINEERING: Electrical Circuits & Engineering I & II: This class will teach students about circuits and electric currents in engineering.

Engineering Club: This will be a club offered to student and be eligible for engineering credit.

Engineering Internship/Job: For each semester/summer a student works for 10/15 hours or more a week for an engineering company, they shall be awarded 0.5 credits.

Intro to Engineering: This course will teach students about engineering, what it entails, the math needed, its practical applications/aspects and its benefit to society.

Mechanical Engineering I & II: These classes will teach students about the mechanics of engineering.

NASA Internship/Job: For each term a student interns, receives a job or partakes in an official NASA high school camp/internships they shall be awarded 1 full engineering credit.

Robotics Competition: For each semester of participation in Robotics, each student shall be awarded 0.5 credits in Engineering.

ENGLISH: American Literature: This Class will introduce students to the works and classics of American Authors in addition to books that have had a major impact on American Culture and Society.

Asian Literature: This class is meant to introduce the various aspects of Asian Literature to the students.

British/Northern Ireland/Scottish/UK/Wales Literature: This course shall introduce students to the History of the UK and its diverse people. It will focus on books that take place in, are about and or written by Authors from the UK or the various regions throughout History.

Classic Literature: This course shall focus on famous and major books written throughout History.

Commas: This class will focus on the strict use of Commas and when it is appropriate to use them in various types of sentences.

Debate: Competitive debate shall count as either an English, Elective OR Political Class Credit.

Dialects/Jargons: This class shall focus on the local dialects of various English speaking Countries and Regions In addition it will focus on accents and pronunciations. This course will also focus on internal jargon language of various professions.

English I, II, III & IV: These classes will teach students the basic principles and functions of English as stated in each School District English Curriculum Guide.

Fiction Literature: This class will focus on fictional stories and apply various concepts to real life.

Historical Fiction: This class will focus on stories of characters based in or around the time of major historical events/eras.

Love/Romance Novels: This class will explore and review the many different types of attraction and love in its many various forms.

Mystery Novels: This class will read many different mystery novels, work on logical and critical thinking and explore the various ways that the characters could have done better in either uncovering the mystery or not being caught.

Science Fiction: This class shall discuss, explore and read various science fiction novels.

ENTERTAINMENT & RECREATION: Each High School shall develop their own entertainment and recreation courses.

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES: Abundance or Lack of Abundance in Natural Resources?: This class shall look at and explore various natural resources and their contributions to the World's population overtime. In addition it will examine key questions such as What are their benefits? How much pollution do Natural Resources actually bring to the population of the Earth? How to classify fossil fuels verses clean natural resources.

Alternative Fuels: This class will consider, examine, explore, look at and review the various Alternative Forms being currently considered, developed & explored.

Carbon Emissions: This class will define what Carbon Emissions are, how Carbon Emissions are legally classified and counted around the World and what the impacts of Carbon Emissions are economically, environmentally and long term global implications are.

Climate Change: This class will explore and studies the changes in climates and ecosystems over time.

Endangered Species: This class will explain how species are declared endangered, where the list is and present the current endangered species.

Environmental Club: Both Membership and participation in the projects of the school's Environmental Club shall count as Environmental Education Credit.

Fossil Fuels: This class shall define what fossil fuels are, how long they will last, how

and where various types of Fossil Fuels can be found/obtained, their benefits and the shelf life remaining before alternatives fuels must be found.

Fracking: This class will examine and explore the benefits, consequences and various methods of Fracking.

Garden Leaders: This class will be responsible for the upkeep of the school garden.

Global Cooling: This class will study and explore the theories of Global Cooling.

Global Warming: This class will study and explore the theories of Global Warming.

Hydro Power: This class will discover the process that water power is made and turned into Electricity, the benefits it brings to society, the consequences of building dams and the disruption of natural habitats.

Intro to Environmental Studies: This course will examine and explore all aspects of the environment and give a brief introduction while serving as a pre req for all other environmental studies courses except for Environmental Club, Garden Leaders and Recycle Monitors.

Recycle Monitors: This class will have students check and work to make sure everything the school is eligible to recycle or reuse within its jurisdiction is done so.

Solar Power: This class will study and learn what Solar Power is, the various ways in which the sun's rays will be harvested, the cost and effectiveness of solar panels. This class will also explore the theory of the Solar Panel Car.

Wind Power: This class will study and learn what Wind Power is, the various ways in which wind can be gathered and turned into clean and renewable electricity, the cost savings and benefits of Wind Power in addition to its economic impact.

FINANCE: 1: Beginning Investments: This class will teach students basic investment terminology and introduce them to the various types of stock markets in addition to the location of major stock markets around the World.

2: Comparative Financial Philosophies of Dave Ramsey & Suze Orman: This class will teach students the financial difference and similarities between Dave Ramsey and Suze Orman in addition to both philosophies on wealth attainment and management.

3: Personal Finance: This class will teach students how to file personal income tax and take advantage of the services provided to them by their bank.

FINE ARTS: Acting I & II: These classes teach the student about basic acting concepts and principles.

Concert and Event Planning: This course teaches students how to book auditoriums, theatres and even venues for concerts, conferences and plays.

Drama: This course introduces students to drama.

Play Production: For students participating in the school play(s) and or competing at District/Regional/State/National play competition for the school they shall be awarded 0.5 credits per semester.

Stagecraft: This course teaches students how decorate a stage/room for the event they want.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES: Arabic I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Arabic courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Arabic Language Immersion: This course awards 0.5 credits per Fall/Spring/Summer studying abroad of 2 weeks or more in an Arabic Speaking country.

Arabic Literature: Examines major works written in Arabic including the Koran.

Arabic Student Host: Hosting an Arabic speaking exchange student shall count for 0.5 credit hours per Fall/Spring/Summer.

Culinary Arabic: Teaches all the foods and drinks in Arabic, table mannerisms of Arabic speaking countries and meal conversation topics in Arabic.

Legal Arabic: Teaches how to phrase things legally in Arabic while reading documents of the Arab League and Arab Courts.

Medical Arabic: Teaches medical terminology, words and phrases in Arabic.

Model Arab League: Participation in the High School Model Arab League shall earn 0.25 credits per term of participation.

French I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of French courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

French Club: Participation in the French Club shall earn 0.25 credits per semester of participation.

French Film: Watch movies in French and then write a critique review about it in French.

French Language Immersion: This course awards 0.5 credits per Fall/Spring/Summer studying abroad of 2 weeks or more in a French Speaking country.

French Literature: Examines major works written in French.

French Student Host: Hosting a French speaking exchange student shall count for 0.5 credit hours per Fall/Spring/Summer.

Legal French: Teaches how to phrase things legally in French while reading French Court Documents.

Medical French: Teaches medical terminology, words and phrases in French.

German I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of German courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

German Club: Participation in the German Club shall earn 0.25 credits per semester of participation.

German Culture: This is a class that covers and compares the cultures of German speaking countries while doing in depth exploration of the various activities/festivities related to German.

German Film: Watch movies in German and then write a critique review about it in German.

German Language Immersion: This course awards 0.5 credits per Fall/Spring/Summer studying abroad of 2 weeks or more in a French Speaking country.

German Literature: Examines major works written in German.

German Student Host: Hosting a German speaking exchange student shall count for 0.5 credit hours per Fall/Spring/Summer.

Legal German: Teaches how to phrase things legally in German while reading German Court Documents.

Hebrew I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Hebrew courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Hebrew Film: Watch movies in Hebrew and then write a critique review about it in Hebrew.

Hebrew Language Immersion in Israel: 0.5 credit hours per Fall/Spring/Summer.

Hebrew Bible: Examines and explores in depth the Hebrew Bible.

Israeli Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Israel.

Israeli Foreign Exchange Student Host: Hosting a foreign exchange student from Israel will result in 0.5 credits per Fall/Spring/Summer.

Jerusalem Dispute: This course will examine in detail the history, occupations, religious and legal claims on Israel.

Italian I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Italian courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Italian Culture: This course examines and explores the culture of Italy.

Italian Film: Watches movies in Italian and then write a critique review about them in Italian.

Italian Language Immersion: 0.5 credit hours per Fall/Spring/Summer in an Italian speaking country.

Italian Literature: Examines major works written in Italian.

Italian Student Host: 0.5 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer for hosting an Italian Student.

Legal Italian: Teaches about the Italian court system, legal Italian phrases and reviews and translates the Italian Court documents of the Amanda Knox case.

Medical Italian: Teaches basic Italian medical phrases, words and terminology.

Japanese I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Japanese courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Japanese Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Japan.

Japanese Film: Watches movies in Japanese and then writes reviews/critiques of them in Japanese.

Japanese Language Immersion in Japan: 0.5 credits awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer studying abroad in Japan of 2 weeks or more.

Japanese Literature: Examines major works written in Japanese.

Japanese Student Host: 0.5 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer of hosting a Japanese student.

Medical Japanese: Teaches basic Japanese medical phrases, words and terminology.

Korean I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Korean courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Comparative Korean Cultures: Compares and contrast the cultures of North and South Korea.

Korean Films: Examines the South Korean Film Industry and the North Korean propaganda channels.

Korean Language Immersion: 0.5 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer term of study abroad in South Korea and 1 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer study abroad in North Korea.

Korean Host Student: Hosting a student from North OR South Korea results in 0.5 credits awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer term.

Mandarin Chinese I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Mandarin Chinese courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Chinese Culture: This course will examine and explore the culture of China.

Chinese Language Immersion: 0.5 credits will be awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer studying abroad in a Mandarin Chinese area of China.

Chinese Host Student: 0.5 credits will be awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer term of hosting a Chinese student.

Persian I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Persian courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Iranian Culture: This course will examine and explore the culture of Iran.

Persian Language Immersion: 1 credit will be awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer term of studying abroad in Iran.

Iranian Host Student: 1 credit will be awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer term of hosting an Iranian Student.

Portuguese I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Portuguese courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Carnival in Brazilian Eyes: This course will focus on carnival in Brazil.

Portuguese Language Immersion: 0.5 credit will be awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer spent in a Portuguese speaking country.

Portuguese Student Host: 0.5 credit will be awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer for hosting a Portuguese speaking student.

Russian I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Russian courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Russian Culture: This course examines the culture of Russia.

Russian Films: Watches movies in Russian and then writes reviews in Russian.

Russian Literature: Examines major works written in Russian.

Legal Russian: Examines the Russian Legal System and Reads Russian Legal/Political documents.

Medical Russia: Teaches basic phrases, words and terminology of medical Russia.

Russian Language Immersion: 1 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer of studying abroad in Russia.

SPANISH I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Spanish courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Argentina Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Argentina.

Business Spanish: Teaches the Spanish business language.

Chilean Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Chile.

Cuban Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Cuba.

Mexican Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Mexico.

Peruvian Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Peru.

Spanish Club: Participation in the Spanish Club shall earn 0.25 credits per semester of participation.

Spanish Film: Watch movies in Spanish and then write a critique review about it in Spanish.

Spanish Language Immersion: This course awards 0.5 credits per Fall/Spring/Summer studying abroad of 2 weeks or more in a Spanish Speaking country.

Spanish Literature: Examines major works written in Spanish.

Spanish Student Host: Hosting a French speaking exchange student shall count for 0.5 credit hours per Fall/Spring/Summer.

Legal Spanish: Teaches how to phrase things legally in Spanish while reading Spanish Court Documents.

Medical Spanish: Teaches Spanish terminology, words and phrases in Spanish.

Turkish I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Turkish courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Turkish Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Turkey.

Turkish Language Immersion: 1 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer of studying abroad in Turkey.

Turkish Student Host: 0.5 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer of hosting a student from Turkey.

Vietnamese I, II, III & IV: This is a sequence of Vietnamese courses from Freshman to Senior year that upon completion goes from beginner to intermediate.

Vietnamese Culture: Examines and explores the culture of Vietnam.

Vietnamese Language Immersion: 0.5 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer of studying abroad in Vietnam.

Vietnamese Student Host: 0.5 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer of hosting a student from Vietnam.

FRESHMAN EXPERIENCE: A class designed to introduce the student to all the resources available in the high school, classes offered and help the student decide which of the 17 emphasis they want to choose and how to achieve it.

GENDER: Anatomy: This class shall teach the anatomy of humans and animals.

Exploring Sexuality: This class shall explore similarities and differences between the sexes.

Female Anatomy: This class shall teach the anatomy of the female.

LGBTQ History: This class will teach about the movement, struggles, rights and history of the LGBTQ community.

Male Anatomy: This class shall teach the anatomy of the Male.

Modern Gender roles in the Family & Society: This class shall teach about the equality for all men and women and what is expected of them in today's World.

Polyandry & Polygamy: This class will teach the students about the history and wrong of taking multiple wives or husbands.

Safe Sex: Must be 16 or older to enroll. If between ages 16 & 18 Parental Approval is Required: This class will teach students various prevention methods.

Traditional Gender Roles throughout the World: This class will examine and explore the traditional roles of both men and women of multiple cultures and society throughout various historical time frames and periods.

Truth about Parenting: This class will teach students the real life struggles of raising and providing for kids, the time commitments it takes, the social life it deprives one of and the stress involved with it.

GEOGRAPHY: 1: Cultural Geography: This class will explore the various customs of different modern day cultures throughout the World.

2: Language Geography: This class will have students learn both the name of common languages and official government languages in each Country.

3: Physical Geography: This class will focus on and have students be able to identify major geographical features and landmarks throughout the World.

4: Religious Geography: This class will teach students the percentages of the population that practice various religions in multiple countries. In addition this class will also teach on the Religious tolerance customs, laws and playing out in practice of various countries.

5: World Regional Geography: This class is to be a combination of all Geography Classes offered. This class shall serve as the prerequisite to all other Geography Classes.

GOVERNMENT: Affidavit Filing: This class will teach students what an affidavit is, the various types of affidavits, the reasons for filling out/filing affidavits and the consequences/possible ramifications.

Amendment Rights: This class will teach students the Bill of Rights, the Amendments that

came after, the purpose of an Article 5 State's Convention, and teach students how to apply and defend their US Constitutional Rights. In addition students will also learn the Oklahoma Bill of Rights.

American Federal Government: This class shall teach students about the various government agencies, federal laws, federal courts and federal regulations.

Constitutional Studies: This class will teach students about the entire US Constitution & the State/Territory Constitution of their High School.

City/County Government: This class will introduce students to the structure of their City and or County Government.

Election Cycle and Races: This class will cover campaign history, bond elections, local elections and state elections in addition to explaining the Primary Process.

European Union: This Class will teach students about the European Union and its role in both Europe and throughout the World.

Independent/Third Political Parties: This class will teach students the names, platforms and positions of Independent/Third Parties in America.

Federal & State Budget Review: Senator Coburns Waste Book Will Be Required Reading. This class will teach students to read and review both the Federal and State Budget while at the same time having students develop their own.

Judicial Process & Review: This class will explain how the justice system works, the implications of fines and various pleas in addition to the very basic concepts of case law.

State Page Program (Example Oklahoma Page Program for High School Students): For Students in the Oklahoma Page Program at the Oklahoma State Capitol this will count as 0.25 credits per page session.

Statutory Law: This class shall teach about city, county, state and federal statues in addition to the sections of titles for various legal issues.

US CONGRESS HIGH SCHOOL INTERNSHIP: For High School students who wish to spend a Fall or Spring Semester in Washington DC as an US Congress Intern, this class will count as 1 full Government Credit.

HISTORY: African History: This class shall teach about the History of the Continent of Africa.

American History: This class shall teach students about the History of America.

Asian History: This class shall teach students about the History of the Continent of Asia.

Australian History: This class shall teach students about the History of Australia.

Canadian History: This class shall teach students about the History of Canada.

Cathedral History: This class will teach students about the History and various types of all religious Cathedrals all around the World.

Environmental History: This class will teach students about the History of the Environment.

European History: This class shall teach students about the History of Europe.

French History: This class will teach students about the History of France.

Hawaiian History: This class will teach students about the History of the Hawaiian Islands.

11: Historical Site Study Abroad Opportunities: 0.5 credits will be awarded per study abroad at a historical site. The specific classes/opportunities offered will vary School District to School District. Parental Approval is Required for students under 18 to participate .

Mexican History: This class shall teach students about the History of Mexico.

Native American History: This class shall teach students about the History of the Native Tribes throughout Central, South and North America.

South American History: This class shall teach students the History of South America.

World History: This class will teach students about the History of the World.

HUMANITIES: American Humanities: This teaches students about the Humanities of America.

Humanities of Europe: This teaches students about the humanities of Europe.

Humanities of Latin America: This teaches students about the Humanities of Latin America.

Beginning Sociology I & II: This class shall teach the basic concepts of Sociology and explore basic functions of social interaction in various social groups. In addition it will also explore social interaction in society.

Mythology: This class will teach students about the mythical stories of many different cultures and societies throughout History.

Study Abroad Trips: The specific classes and opportunities offered will vary School District to School District. Parental Approval is Required for students under 18.

INTERNATIONAL STUDIES: Comparative Political Systems: This class will compare and contrast the various forms of Government structures and types of systems around the World.

Customs: This class will teach students the purpose of Customs and their functions at all US Ports and Gateways.

Dangers of Traveling Abroad for US Citizens: This class will teach students about the risk of catching disease, cultural insults and ways to avoid getting picked up by local bias law enforcement.

Housing Overseas: This Class will teach students about the living conditions and real-estate laws of obtaining and living in Apartments/Houses outside of the US.

Intro to International Relations: This class will teach students about Diplomacy, Extradition Treaties, Trade Agreements and how events across borders impact America.

Intro to International Studies: Student will be introduced to International organizations, the International Studies Table of Elements and understand international career paths.

Model African Union: 0.25 credit awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer participation.

Model EU: 0.25 credit awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer participation.

Model OAS: 0.25 credit awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer participation.

Model UN: 0.25 credit awarded per Fall/Spring/Summer participation

INTERNSHIPS: Any unpaid form of work that takes up a large amount of time for the student while gaining job experience.

JOBS: Any job in which the student is paid and works 10 or more hours a week for money. Depending on the type of job the student can receive anywhere between 0.25-1 credit per term.

JOURNALISM: Journalist Ethics: This course teaches the ethics of journalism.

Journalist Research & Responsibilities; This course teaches the requirements for a journalist of source methods to print something and the risk/professional obligations they hold in publishing said material.

Journalistic Writing I & II: This classes teaches the basic writing style of articles with the follow up course of jazzing up the readings and gaining traction of click bait.

Intro to Journalism: This course teaches students the basics of journalism.

Morning Announcements: A semester long course of morning announcements.

School Blog: Awarded credit for running and maintaining the official school blog.

School Paper: Awarded credit for running the school paper.

School Yearbook: Awarded credit for running the school yearbook.

LEGAL STUDIES: City/County Code: This class shall teach students about the city and or country code in which they live and or the school they attend is in.

Civil Procedure: This Class will teach students about the procedure in their local county courtrooms.

Federal Law: This class will teach students about Federal Agency laws and Federal Titles, Codes and Statues.

Immigration Law: This class will teach students about the laws of immigration and its process.

International Criminal Court: This class will introduce students to the International Criminal Court, its purpose and the laws and statutes in the Criminal Code of the International Criminal Court.

International Law: This class will teach student laws of various International Organizations.

State Law: This class will teach students about the Constitution, Statutes and Titles of the State in which they live.

LEADERSHIP: Any Student Council position, Club Officer position, sports/debate team Captain, major presence in a community service organization like Key Club/Rotary Club and or Leadership organizations like Shine OR YLX should equal 0.25 credit per Fall/Spring/Summer. In addition each school shall develop its own leadership prep and development seminars.

LITERATURE: Specific courses to be developed by a group of Literature experts.

MATH: Algebra I, II & III: These classes will teach students about Algebra.

Calculus I & II: This class will teach students about Calculus.

Geometry I & II: This class will teach students about Geometry.

Pre Calc: This class will teach students about the basic Calculus foundations to prepare students to take Calculus.

Pre Trig: This class will teach students about the basic Trigonometry foundations to prepare the student to take Trigonometry.

Statistics I & II: These classes will teach students about the various aspects of Statistics.

Trigonometry I & II: These classes will teach students about the various aspects of Trigonometry.

MUSIC: Band: This class will teach students how to play instruments with multiple people in order to create great musical masterpieces.

Cello: This class will teach students how to play the Cello.

Choir: This class is for the musically gifted to come together and share their voices with

the World.

Clarinet: This class will teach students how to play the Clarinet.

Classical Music: Students will listen to and learn how to recognize various types of classical music and composers by sound.

Contemporary Music: Students will learn and compare the different styles and types of music.

Flute: This class will teach students how to play the Flute.

Guitar: This class will teach students to play both the Acoustic and Electrical Guitar.

Jazz: This class will teach the history and sound of jazz.

Modern Music: This class will examine the most popular artist of today.

Piano: This class will teach students how to play the Piano.

Recorder: This class will teach students how to play the Recorder.

Rock & Roll: This class will help soothe the soul by teaching students the History of Rock & Roll.

Trumpet: This class will teach students how to play the Trumpet.

PE: Intro to Nutrition: This course teaches students about the importance of nutrition.

Team Sports: Any official sport offered by the school shall count as 0.5 credits per term.

Weight Lifting: Teaches students how to lift weights. May be repeated every semester.

Youth Fitness/Sport Camps: Students running or helping the coaches with youth fitness/sports camps are eligible for 0.25 credits per camp.

PHILSOPHY I & II.

POLITICS: American Politics: This course explains the politics of America.

Brazilian Politics: This course explains the politics of Brazil.

Congressional Legislation Battles: This course explains the battles over major pieces of legislation in the US Congress.

Diversity Politics: This course explores diversity movements and undertones in politics.

EU Parliament Politics: This course explains the politics of the European Union (EU).

French Politics: This course explains the politics of France.

Global Politics: This course examines the geopolitics situation in the World today.

Human Trafficking: This course looks at human trafficking in detail and compares human trafficking laws and rights of victims in different countries.

International Political Disputes: This course looks at current and ongoing disputes between nations.

Joint Coalitions: This course identifies and looks at the interest of joint coalitions.

Korean Politics: This course examines the politics of both North and South Korea.

Liberalization Policies of the World:

Mexican Politics: This course examines the politics of Mexico.

NATO Alliance: This course looks at US NATO allies, the structures of vote and the importance of the US remaining in NATO.

Ongoing Disputes: This looks at ongoing disputes between nations.

Peruvian Politics: This course examines the politics of Peru.

Russian Politics: This course examine the politics of Russia.

Sea Disputes: This course looks at dispute of territories in the ocean, wailing disputes between Japan, New Zealand and Australia and China's aggressive expansion of artificial islands in the South China Sea.

Turkish Politics: This course looks at the shift in Turkish politics, the failed "coup" attempt and Erdogan.

Universal Income Theory: This course examines both the positive and negative arguments of Universal Income.

Venezuelan Politics: This course examines Venezuelan politics, political parties, the rise to Our Chavez and the torturous Maduro legacy.

Water Crisis & Disputes: This looks at countries and areas that lack clean drinking water.

PSYCHOLOGY I & II:

RELIGIOUS STUDIES: Biblical Literature: This course will examine the stories in the Bible.

Buddhism: This class will teach about the Mahayana (The Great Vehicle), Theravada (Way of the Elders), Vajrayana (Tibetan Dolly Lama) and Zen Buddhism. It will cover Nirvana, the 4 Noble Truths and the 8 Fold Path.

Christianity: This class will teach students about the History of Christianity and the many different denominations.

Comparative Religious Texts: This course will examine, compare and contrast multiple religious text of multiple religions.

Comparative World Religions: This Class will compare and contrast various Religions and Denominations around the Globe. It will examine similarities and look to understand the differences.

Confucianism: This class will teach students about traditional Chinese Society and the Analects, Sayings and Teachings of Confucius.

Hinduism: This class will teach students about Mahatma Gandhi, the Rig Veda, the Upanishads, Atman, the all in one encompassing Brahman, the Bhagavad-Gita, samsara and Karma.

Islam: This class will teach students about the Quran, the Sunni & Shias, Mohamad and traditional Islamic customs and traditions verses modern ones. It will also pinpoint the majority population of Islam in multiple countries throughout the World.

Jainism: This class will teach students about Ahimsa, Asceticism, Tirthankaras (Salvation), Loka, an age lasting 21,000 years, the Five Great Vows, Shvetambaras (those whose garment is white) & Digambaras (those whose garment is the sky).

Judaism: This class will learn about the Torah, Jewish traditions and customs while

including a fieldtrip to a Synagogue. In addition it will also teach the History of Israel.

Sikhism: This class will teach students about the peaceful nature of Sikhism. Students will also learn about the Adi Granth (most sacred text, equivalent to the Bible, Koran and Torah), its foundational roots in both Hinduism and Islam, the role of the Guru (Priest), the purpose of community kitchens, Gurdwara (Christian Church equivalent to Sikh worship) and the five K's.

Taoism: Students will learn about the Yin & Yang with the balance in both Nature & the World.

Zoroastrianism: Students will learn about Zarathustra, Ahura Mazada (Allah, God & Yahweh), the Gathas (Ancient Zoroastrianism Scripture), Avesta, Ethical Dualism, the Zoroastrianism concept of Good and Evil, God's two sons, the Holy Spirit and burial practices.

Physical Science: This class will teach students about Physical Science.

Physics I, II, III & IV: These classes will teach students about Physics.

Robotics: Students who are in Robotics may count this as Science Credit.

SPEECH: Public Speaking OR Debate.

TECHNOLOGY: 1: Application for Major Network Development: Students who either design an Android and or Apple App for a major company and or a fun app that receives 10,000 or more downloads may count it as Technology Credit.

Computer Applications I & II: These classes will teach the basics functions and programs of Computers.

Computer Programing I, II, III & IV: These classes will teach the basic programing codes of the Computer.

Databases I, II, III & IV: This class will teach students how to create, design and navigate databases.

Film Editing and Development I, II, III, VI & V: This class will teach students how to edit film into clip and movie scenarios, while teaching camera angles and downloading.

Film Studies:

History of Technology Development I, II, III, IV, V & VI: History of Technology Development 1 will look at all the Technology before Christ. History of Technology Development II will look at Technology made, developed and used between the birth of Christ and the year 500 AD. History of Technology Development III will look at technology made and used between 500 AD & the year 1000. History of Technology and Development IV will look at Technology made and used between 1000 & 1500. History

of Technology and Development V will look at Technology made and used between 1500 & 1999. History of Technology and Development will look at Technology made and used since 2000.

Product Development, Market, Patent & Placement: For any student who develops a new product or creates a substantial beneficial modification to a product, gets it patented in their name and has it sold in a store of some type (Internet or Physical Store) shall receive 1 full technology credit and 1 full elective credit.
